Nebraska Monthly Economic Indicators: July 3, 2024

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Summary: The Leading Economic Indicator-Nebraska rose by 0.26% in May 2024. The increase in the leading indicator, designed to predict economic growth six months into the future, implies that the Nebraska economy will grow through the end of 2024. There was an increase in manufacturing hours worked in May, as Nebraska continues to benefit from strong demand for food products. Business expectations remained positive. Respondents to the May Survey of Nebraska Business reported plans to increase sales and employment over the next six months.

Leading Economic Indicator – Nebraska

Figure 1 shows the change in the Leading Economic Indicator – Nebraska (LEI-N) during May 2024 compared to the previous month. The LEI-N predicts economic growth six months into the future. The LEI-N rose by 0.26%.



Figure 2 shows the change in the leading indicator over the last six months. The indicator has increased in four of the last six months, although monthly increases were modest in April and May.





Figure 3 shows the components of change in the Leading Economic Indicator – Nebraska during May. The change in the LEI–N is the weighted average of changes in each component (see page 5). Four leading indicator components improved during May. There was an increase in manufacturing hours worked during the month, as Nebraska continues to benefit from strong demand for food products. Business expectations also were positive. Respondents to the May *Survey of Nebraska Business* reported plans to increase both sales and employment over the next six months. There also was a modest increase in airline passenger counts and a small improvement in the U.S. dollar exchange rate.



Coincident Economic Indicator - Nebraska

The Coincident Economic Indicator - Nebraska (CEI-N) is a measure of the current size of the Nebraska economy. The CEI-N fell by 0.46% in May 2024, as seen in Figure 4.





Figure 5 shows the change in the CEI-N over the last 6 months. The CEI-N has declined over the period. Weakening agricultural commodity prices have put downward pressure on CEI-N over the last six months. The pace of decline was significant from February through April, but the decline was more modest in May.



Three components of the CEI-N fell significantly during May 2024, as is seen in Figure 6. There was a drop in agricultural commodity prices during the month. Business conditions also were negative, as respondents to the May *Survey of Nebraska Business* reported a modest decline in sales and employment. Electricity sales also were down after adjusting for seasonal factors. On the positive side, real private wages rose during May. 



Figure 7 shows a forecast for the CEI-N over the next six months. The forecast calls for strong economic growth in Nebraska in mid-2024 but moderate economic growth towards the end of the year. This expectation is consistent with changes in the LEI-N reported in Figure 2.



Weights and Component Shares

Table 1 shows the weights used to aggregate the individual components into the LEI-N and CEI-N. The weights are the inverse of the "standardized" standard deviation of each component variable. The term standardized simply means that the inverse standard deviations are adjusted proportionately to sum to 1. This weighting scheme makes sense since individual components that are more stable have a smaller standard deviation, and therefore, a larger inverse standard deviation. A large movement in a typically stable economic series would provide a more powerful signal of economic change than a large movement in a series with significant month-to-month fluctuations.

Tables 2 and 3 show the calculation for the change in LEI-N and CEI-N between April and May of 2024. Weights (from Table 1) are multiplied by the change to calculate the contribution of each component. Contributions are converted to percentage terms and summed.

Performance of the LEI-N and CEI-N

Further information is available on both economic indicators to demonstrate how well the CEI-N tracks the Nebraska economy and how well the LEI-N leads the CEI-N. Figure 8 shows the value of CEI-N and the real gross state product (real GDP) in Nebraska from 2001 through the fourth quarter of 2022, using data provided by the Bureau of Economic Analysis, U.S. Department of Commerce. CEI-N closely tracks Nebraska's real GDP for the full two-decade period, although it sometimes exceeds state GDP for a period, typically when agricultural commodity prices are higher. The correlation coefficient between the two-pictured series is 0.96.




Figure 9 again shows the values for the CEI-N. It also graphs six-month forward values for the LEI-N. Recall that the LEI-N is intended to forecast the Nebraska economy six months into the future. This implies that Figure 9 compares the predicted movement in CEI-N (predicted by LEI-N values six months earlier) with the actual movement in CEI-N. In Figure 9, predicted values using the LEI-N track trends and movement in the CEI-N. The long-run correlation coefficient between CEI-N and six-month forward values of LEI-N is 0.92. The two series, however, have deviated in recent months. The two series often deviate during periods when agricultural commodity prices are declining or rising rapidly.
